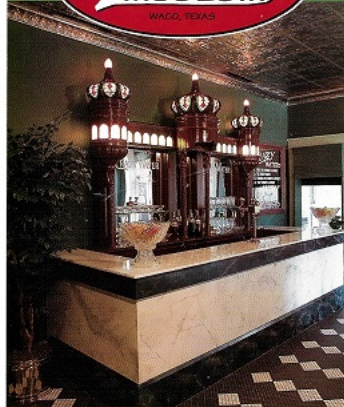
The Texas Ranger Hall of Fame and Museum complex is dedicated to the history and lore of the legendary Texas Rangers—the oldest state law enforcement agency in the nation and an enduring symbol of Texas and the American West.

The Homer Garrison Museum houses the largest existing collection of artifacts related to the Texas Rangers, some dating back to their Spanish and Mexican origins. Among the treasures are Texas Ranger badges, firearms, tack, and personal gear; the weapons and possessions of notorious outlaws Bonnie & Clyde; famed Billy-the-Kid's 1873 Winchester Carbine and the shotgun he used to escape from the Lincoln County, New Mexico jail.

The Hall of Fame memorializes Texas Rangers who gave their lives in the line of duty or served with great distinction.

The Moody Texas Ranger Memorial Library contains books, archives, photographs and oral histories related to the Texas Rangers.

The Texas Ranger Hall of Fame is located in Waco, Texas (midway between Dallas and Austin) at Interstate-35, Exit 335B in Fort Fisher Park.

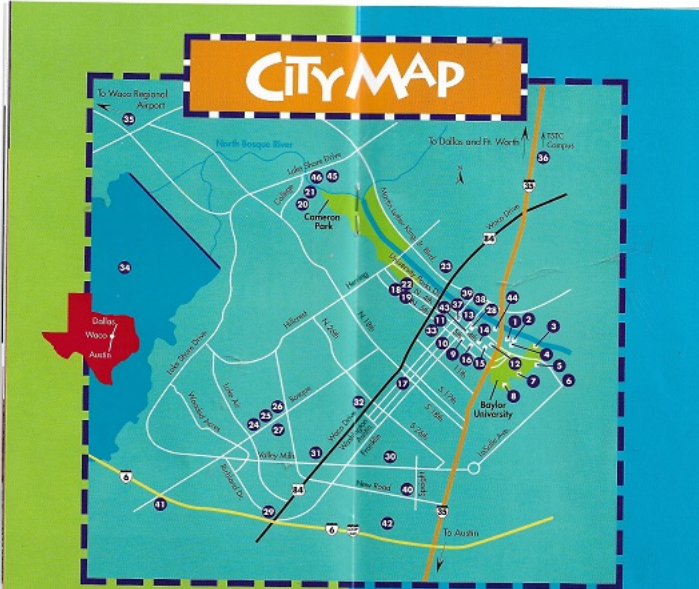
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CITY MAP

Suspension Bridge

Built in 1870 and a model for the Brooklyn Bridge, this famous Waco landmark provided cattle and cowboys following the Chisholm Trail the only span across the Brazos River. Enjoy free summer concerts in Indian Spring Park. Stroll the River Walk all year long! IH-35 exit 335B, University Parks Drive and Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive between Franklin and Washington Avenues.
